The Pep Club has been very supportive during this year's season! Every game night, the Pep Club students come together to fellowship with food and, of course, a few games of corn hole!

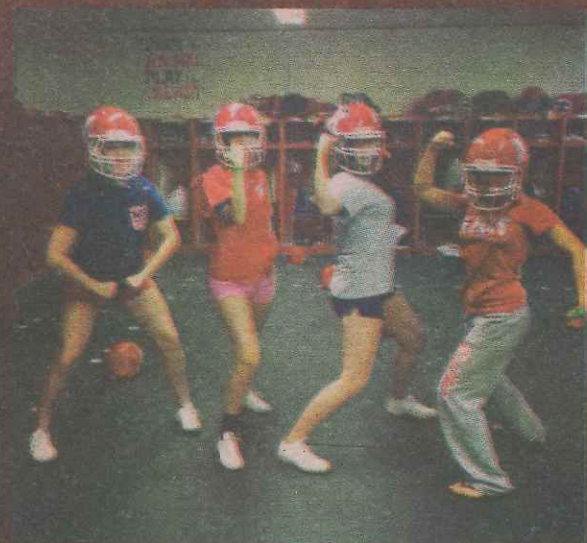


MHS Cheerleading

This year, the FCA has already hosted two 5th Quarter Parties in the cafeteria after football games for food, fellowship, and some great devotions!

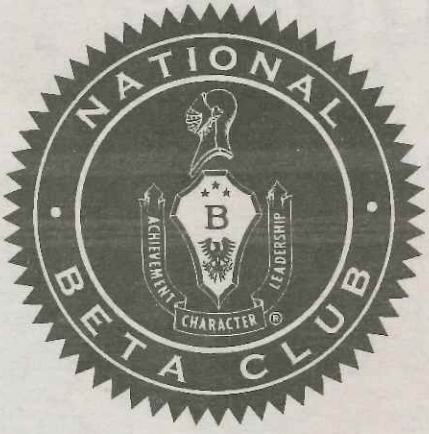
McEwen's Future Business Leaders of America

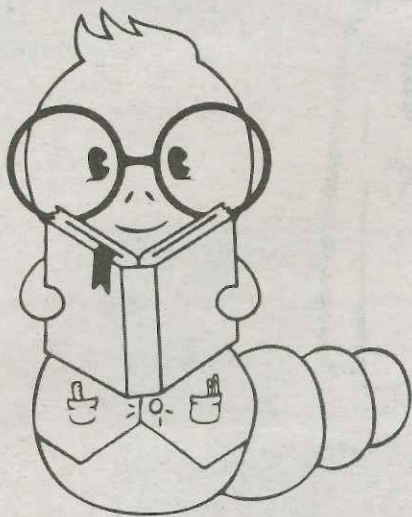

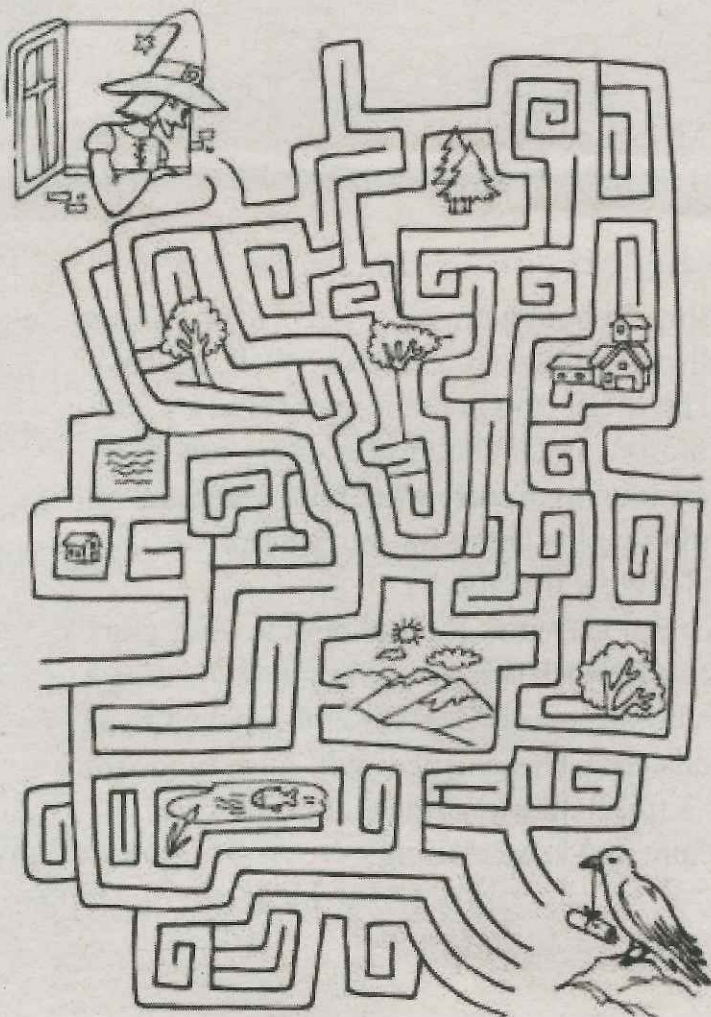

High Schoolers Learn about Ag Careers

Nathan Rudgers pointed to his tie, featuring the famous farm couple in the American Gothic painting. That image, the farmers with the pitchfork, no longer fits today's agriculture, Rudgers told about 200 high school students on Thursday. Rudgers, the former state agriculture commissioner from Pavilion, was among the panelists during a Harvest Festival at Genesee Community College. Rudgers now works with Farm Credit as a business consultant.

In the 1990s, many farmers didn't steer their children to careers on the farm, he said. Commodity prices were so low farmers were going out of business or barely eking out a living. But Rudgers said agriculture is in a new, more dynamic era, with soaring crop prices, surging demand for the products and a technology revolution in equipment and seeds.

"We are in the agriculture century," Rudgers told the students. "There will be tremendous opportunities because there will be a lot more mouths to feed." Farmers will have to drastically boost their output in the coming decades, as the world population is projected to jump from 6.9 billion people in 2010 to 9.5 billion in 2050. Locally, farmers are working fertile land that can't be outsourced to another country.

"Agriculture is a land-based business and land doesn't leave," he said. GCC hosted students throughout the GLOW region for the discussion about careers in agriculture. The college in recent years has pushed to connect more local high schoolers with careers in the area's leading industry.

Some of the students have grown up on farms and are well-versed in the potential careers. Andy Underhill, a junior at Elba with a farm background, said he is considering a career as a dairy nutritionist.

He sees a career in agriculture as a fun vocation. He said he isn't afraid to work hard and he knows many of the jobs pay well. Oliver Ewell from Pavilion works on his uncle's farm, milking cows. He was encouraged by Thursday's ag career expo, which showed a breadth of careers, either directly on the farm or in support of those operations.

"There are more jobs you can do and you don't necessarily have to live on a farm," he said.

James Kingston, manager of the Monroe Tractor in Batavia, started his career working as a food inspector, and then joined the Soil and Water Conservation District in Orleans County, working with several environmental initiatives, from cleaning ditches to mapping drainage tile. He was a field crops specialist for Cornell before joining Monroe Tractor.

He told students about the widespread use of computers, satellites and other high-tech equipment in operating today's tractors and farm machinery. Mike Stanyard, field crops specialist, shared about his passion for insects and helping farmers combat the pests' damage to crops. Tristan Zuber also discussed her job as a dairy processing specialist with Cornell, working with food processors, especially the new yogurt plants in Batavia. Another panelist, Jerry Boltoldo, works with local dairies as specialist with Cornell. He grew up outside New York City and worked as vet. He didn't have a farm background growing up.

Rudgers said farms would be willing to hire local residents without an ag background. "If you show up and show enthusiasm and a willingness to be there, they're not going to turn you away," Rudgers said. "Good producers figure out how to use that talent."

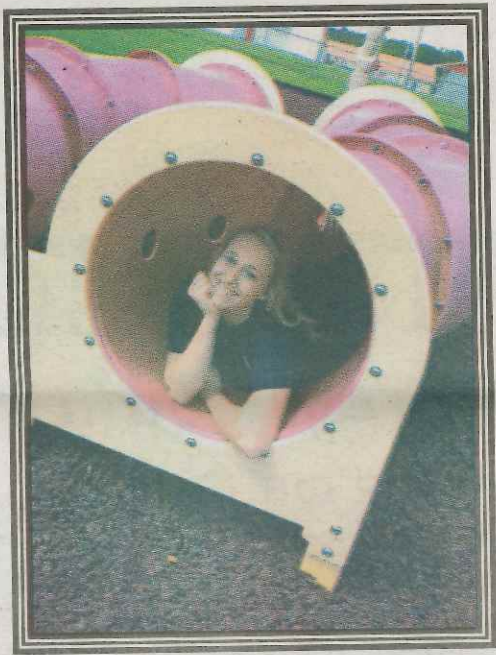
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
